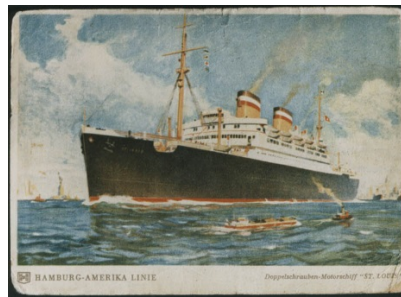

- Learn effective analysis and questioning techniques to help your students use primary source materials and meet Indiana Content Area Literacy Standards
